What is Labor Day?

Labor day is an annual holiday to honor the people who fought for better worker rights, but that's not even all of it. There is a lot of history about the Labor Day holiday.

History of Labor Day: The Industrial Revolution

During the industrial revolution in the late 19th century, many workers faced difficult and harsh conditions. They worked more than 10 hours a day just to get paid very little. It was very unfair for those workers, so unfair that one day, the workers had enough and joined together. They created unions and protested for higher pay, safer working conditions, better hours and more. Fortunately, they were listened to by the governments and their employers, and achieved their goal. Nowadays, many workers today are getting treated fair and more equally.

History of Labor Day: The Creator

Peter J. McGuire was a man born in 1852, in New York during the Industrial Revolution. He grew up with a poor Irish Catholic family. Throughout his childhood, his parents worked long hours with low wages and harsh conditions. He saw how unfair it was. When McGuire became an adult, he worked as a carpenter and became a labor activist. He had the most significant role in the Industrial Revolution since he was the leader of the labor union. In 1881, McGuire co-founded the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America. Then, one year later on September 5, 1882, the first Labor Day was celebrated. Peter J. McGuire is most credited for his role in the creation of Labor Day.



How People Celebrate Labor Day Nowadays

Have you ever wondered how people celebrate Labor Day nowadays? A lot of people stay home and relax while other people go out and have fun. Others will take their time to honor the unions who fought for better worker rights by attending Labor Day parades. People celebrate their Labor Day by putting up balloons and flags of their country while the marching bands perform.
